


Above: **Fr Stephen Stavrou**, the speaker, with an icon painted by Leon Liddament

## Watching the wildlife





The planning of 'Praying with Icons', the exhibition of Fr David and Leon's icons in the Hostry at Norwich Cathedral for the month from 5th December 2013 onwards goes on and Mike Dixon has been busy photographing the icons for us, to include in the catalogue. Mike is finding icons we did not know were painted, when he goes to photograph certain ones for the exhibition and archives.

It will be twenty years on **December 8**th since **Fr David** died and through the good work of two volunteers on the archives we are seeing the fruit of his work. The archives are being gathered into order and the importance work carried out here is becoming increasingly clear – the sheet music and service books as well as the icons, the converting of the Chapel and ministering to many people, in London, Nottingham and Manchester, and of course the growth of the small community in Walsingham. As time passes we see a person more clearly in the mind's eye; Father David was a man of vision coupled with great common sense. His legacy is enduring, Memory Eternal!

The Chapel of St. Seraphim is a place of Orthodox Christian worship. The Faith to which it bears witness is that of the Undivided Christian Church before West and East became separated in the Eleventh Century. Its ancient tradition of worship and prayer is rooted in its biblical and apostolic inheritance, and is expressed in living symbolic form.

In 1966 the Anglican Shrine authorities asked that someone be sent to take care of the Orthodox chapel there, and Father Mark Meyrick (who subsequently became a monk, with the name David) came to undertake that task. It was soon apparent that the open plan construction of the chapel was unsuited to a pattern of regular services and in 1967 Father David and three companions, with £25 between them, settled in this building which, until the closure of the railway in the early 60s, had been Walsingham's station on the line between Wells and Fakenham. They converted the booking hall and ticket office into the nave and altar of their new chapel, and crowned it with bell tower, onion dome and cross.

The painting and selling of icons was, from the outset, an important part of the Orthodox witness here. Following Father David's death in 1993, his colleague Leon Liddament continued and developed that tradition until his own death in 2010.
